

Due in part to the success of Chicago ComputerFest '91, many other Atari-oriented shows are planning to expand, and new shows are on the North American schedule. As usual, check the News Journal and the club BBS for the latest info on these shows. It is a worthwhile experience attending any of the major Atari events; I'd strongly encourage you to make plans to participate during the coming months.



Time to clear the air regarding our agreement with Atari regarding the Chicago ComputarFast! As reported in the minutes published last month, there is a piece of equipment that Atari had originally promised but we will not receive. In the rush and confusion in packaging the computers to send back to the west coast, a Mega STe instead of a TI was put aside for the club. This was my mistake not Atari's Since equipment sales from the show was also included in the show proceeds, the club basically got the financial benefit of the TI but not the machine itself. Atari actually delivered more than the original agreement! We are discussing the possibility of doing another show with Atari in the near fiture. Our major problem now is finding facilities available that will not conflict with another major show. Also, a show earlier in the year is preferred meaning no possibility of a snow or sleet storm. This might mean that we will not do a show until early 1993, but it is not because Atari was unfair in their dealing with our club.

We did have one bad debt. This was Hybrid Arts. I have tried to call them but they just take a message and never return my phone calls. This is unfortunate since the club did not make a large amount of money from the show and we hoped this could be seed money for future shows. But we did have this bad debt reducing our profit by about 20 percent.

All elected board members will fill one of the officer positions. This is a great way to get more involved in club activities. Most of the positions do not require a lot of time, usually a few extra hours a month and an additional officers meeting.

Time to start planning for the summer. Our picnic will be held August 8th at the Old School House Forest Preserve in Libertyville. So mark your calendar!

ATARI-TALK and Tips

I have another compatibility story for you this month. But this story concerns in TRA manufacturer compatibility, not in TER manufacturer compatibility--and have no fear Atari buffs, the company is NOT Atari. But the company is well-established; I was a bit surprised. I was also surprised when my Atari ST came to the rescue, thanks to its ability to read "MSDOS"-formatted disks; maybe some of you readers wouldn't be so surprised, but I was. Also delighted.

I recently bought a sleek, lightweight, semi-memory-rich (640K + 20 meg hard disk) Tandy 1800HD Notebook. I installed their (other-company-supplied) memory manager which recovered 288K from unused program areas, so now I have about 0.925 meg of RAM. I know--I'm a traitorous wretch, but I like this machine; besides, it was on sale for a good price (Tandy is dumping its 286 line I guess). And as some of you may have guessed over the issues, I'm an Atari/Tandy-Shack person anyway. I hear that Tandy makes computers for the space shuttles--and they bought Grid Systems. I'm doing this piece on my new toy right now, checking it out. I like the snap feeling to the keyboard, similar to the Atari keyboard.

I ran the tutorial, installed the memory manager, bought an MS DOS manual and formatted some disks. Then I wanted to transfer my writing files from the 600 disks to the 1800 disks—the real beginning to this story...finally.

I ran into the living room (as I said once before, you should see me "run"), grabbed my writing disks (Of course Tandy would support upward compatibility!), back to the kitchen table, disk in, copy, open file, GARBAGE. What did I do wrong? Nothing that I know of--just tried to read a 600-formatted disk with the 1800. Didn't work.

Idea. I took the 600 disk into our office, fired-up Mr. Atari and copied my files onto his hard disk with DCOPY36. Then I switched disks to the 1800-formatted disk and copied the files back to that disk (this was all done on 720K-format). Then I again "ran" to the kitchen where I copied all my files onto the DESKMATE (word processor, etc.) area of my Tandy hard disk. When I opened all of my files, they looked allright. Any comments out there?

Reading the "Year in review" article in the Jan. NJ makes me wonder if Atari has it all together yet in the U.S. I guess everyone's a critic these days. Maybe 1992 will be the year that Atari really does well in the U.S.; with the economy going the way it is, people may realize that power without the

usual price is really true. I wouldn't get rid of my Atari for any other machine on the market. It always comes through for me in my type of use-- "Works for me."

I recently downloaded a neat desktop accessory (.ACC file). I always like to expand my screen to maximum when using WW ST but can never see the CAPS indicator button because of it's being covered up. The NCAPS.LZH on Pegasus is the definitive answer! It puts a CAPS indicator in the upper right corner of the screen; a small square that blackens when you lock caps. You can always see your CAPS status.



Minutes - February 8, 1992

The February meeting of LCACE was brought to order at 12:01 P.M. by President Mike Brown. The meeting was held at the Warren/Newport Library, in Gurnee, Illinois.

Vice President Larry Grauzas began the officers' reports by confirming that LCACE WILL NOT be receiving the TT which was previously promised by Atari Corporation and Bob Brodie, for our efforts in organizing and staging the recent Chicago Computarfast. The recent departure of Gregg Pratt and a shortage of TTs was the reason given for Atari's failure to live up to the agreement. Larry once again mentioned that Hybrid Arts has still not paid the \$425.00 owed to LCACE from the Computerfest. Bob Brodie said to Larry that he would try to enlist Atari Corporation's aid in collecting the overdue debt from Hybrid Arts.

Treasurer and Python sysop Steve Kostelnik said there is a balance of \$1,194.51 in the LCACE account. There still have been no successful connections at 9600 baud on Python. Steve is trying to borrow another 9600 baud modem in an effort to solve the unknown problem preventing communication on Python at 9600 baud.

Dwight (JJ) Johnson, Newsletter Editor and LCACE Librarian, said that his copier is down which prevented him from having additional copies of the newsletter and PD News Journal available. New additions to the library include AHDI 5.0, Atari's latest version of their hard disk utilities, and the latest version of STWriter Elite, which also includes Spanish and German versions and full documentation. Many new demo programs too numerous to list have also been added to the library and on Pegasus BBS (708-623-9570) for which JJ is sysop.

Membership Chairman Steve Yeaton had one membership renewal and solicited contributions for the club's 50-50 raffle, (later won by Dennis Renner from the Rockford Atariuser group).

SSI has done it again, with their legendary Dungeons and Dragons games. This is their latest in the Legend series, following hot on the heels of the original. If you did not like the original Eye of the Beholder, but are looking for something vastly different, than I would not suggest buying this. It is however, quite improved over the original.

If you are not familiar with the original, then I must explain it. This is a Dungeon Master type game, based on the second edition Advanced Dungeons and Dragons role playing fantasy game system, from TSR, Inc. It provides a stunning first-person perspective, in which you look out of your character's eyes in all three dimensions. They attempted to add the fourth dimension, of time, but did a very poor job. Everything else does not wait for your actions, which does provide realism, but the problem I discovered was that it would not allow you to dodge enemy fireballs or attacks, like Dungeon Master did. It locks you up and forces you to take the blow; this proves to be very frusterating, especially considering the tremendous speed and dexterity given to the monsters. Other than that, everything else was very well done. Certain character classes will tell you different things about traps and puzzles. Most of it is just useless chatter, but some can be very valuable. You may also need special races to comprehend the writings on walls, because many of it is foreign to the human mind. You can touch and use anything you see. Breaking down walls, moving loose bricks, and forcing doors are all included. Everything you find, including rotten food, cursed weapons, and rocks (hint hint) will probably have some sort of benevolent application.

By now you, you probably know how the game is supposed to work, so I will get to the fun part--actually experiencing it. The graphics and sound are just about as good as we can get with present day technology. You start out the game in the forest outside of Darkmoon. The graphics here are quite nice, especially the gravesites that you can actually dig up, but I did not really get a feeling that the designers put too much effort into designing this. The trees clearly looked like the walls they were designed from, which really seems unrealistic. Once in the castle, the true power of this program's graphics will reveal itself. The graphics appear to be totally redesigned in this sequel. A castle, cattacomb, and three towers are all to your disposal. This game is considerably larger than the original, not necessarily in space, but in content. Another nice addition is that you will actually meet and talk to many more people and monsters than before, adding to the overall realism. The sound-effects are very well done, even though I had hoped for better. The ecrie tones from spells and the distant footfalls of a monster are a vital part to this game.

They made some interesting changes to this sequel, most important of which is the fact that you can now save several positions instead of just one, and you can even name them to help you remember exactly where you were at the time of the save. This is a very helpful feature. I was also glad to see that they decided to put an animated ending to this one, so when (if) you complete the game, you will get a better reward than just a screen of text.

Other than this, no other important technical changes were made, other than some new spells and weapons.

Overall, I would recommend this program to any role-playing-game enthusiast. It contains all the characteristes needed for a great game. And for those who have played and loved Dungeon Master, you are going to love this one. The seven years between the release of the two really makes a big difference. Let me say again, that if you do not have a VGA or an equivalent graphics card then you are truely wasting your money. Some sort of music card would also be very nice, though not as important. If anything, this game is showing us that we have achieved just about as much as we are going to, with the current hard drive technology. Imagine the possibilities with a 680 megabyte CD ROM. The monsters would walk smoothly and realisticly, everyone you meet would actually talk, not just print imformation on the screen--we will see this fairly soon. But for now, we have to use what we have, and this [game] is certainly one of the best.

The Devils Toy

I sometimes think my modem is an instrument of the Devil! I am hooked on bulletin boards and I can't shake the urge to download every likely-looking file I find. I now have 40 disks full of ARC'd files of utilities, applications, games, languages, operating systems and communications programs. God knows how many megabytes are encoded there! Let's see: 40 times roughly 720 k equals...

These have been unARC'd into 39 disks of utilities, accessories and applications, 10 disks of games (I've had to rein in my impulse on games because I'm so busy downloading and sorting, I don't have much time to play games), six disks of telecommunication stuff and 12 disks of language programs and related files. All of this is strictly PD and shareware. I also have piles of commercial programs, of course.

Smoking Your Print Head

Oh, how I love to print long .DOC files! My poor Panasonic printer has gone through a veritable mountain of paper and worn out countless ribbons. I'm probably pressing the upper limit of the print head which is good for millions of characters.

Midnight Madness

Because I'a a decent and considerate chap in most ways, this has lead me to work the BBSs in the middle of the night in order not to hog the precious telephone lines during busy periods. What a thrill to download a whopper like Uniterm or Aladdin!

Modem madness is not limited to downloading files--they have to be un-ARC'd, dumped on to the appropriate floppy and run though my favorite cataloguer. Then if the file looks promising, I have to print it out and then file the hard copy. This leads to a hacker's version of Parkinson's Law: if you have enough ARCed and unARCed file to maintain, you can spend all your time doing just that and not have timeto do anything else.

Working the BBSs isnot limited to downloading files. No Sireel Reading and leaving messages is just as addictive. Just about any subject under the sun is fair game (and some of it gets pretty gamey). When things have gotten dull. I've been known to feed in some irritation message, leading to a delightful spilling of spleen. A sly note left here or there can give rise to an avalanche of responses. How our users do rise to the challenge.

User to the Rescue

But more than a place for spirited discussions, the BBSs are a place to get sound advice on all manner of problems concerning hardware or software. This is particularly true of the National Capital Atari Users' Group (NCAUG, Ottawa, Canada). One cannot but be impressed by the way users leap to the aid of someone in need of help. And the advice is almost always very sound.

I had the dubious honor and obligation of using my collection of ARC's file to help restore fir file sections of more than one BBS to some semblance of its former glory. Well, what's to become of me and my mad passion? I guess I'll have to continue to feed my insatiable longing for new and different PD and shareware files. I might point out that my deep sense of obligation has cost me a pretty penny in money orders to shareware authors. Many of their offerings are excellent and worthy of our support.

The Great Piracy Questionnaire

After reading several articles this past year on software piracy, the thought occurred to me that maybe part of the problem is not that there are so many dishonest people out there, but people just aren't educated about software piracy.

So, in order to better bring the problem to life for each user, I sat down and wrote the following questionnaire covering several real-life situations. I hope that for each of us, it will stir the imaginations, as well as the conscience.

The following are situations that you may encounter as a computer user, followed by questions about the situations. The results of these questions will define whether you are an upstanding and responsible member of the computing community or you need to clean up your act!

- 1. A friend approaches you and says "For being such a good friend and helping me with the computer problem I had the other day, I'm letting g you have a copy of Calamus." You then:
 - A. Say, "No, thank you, you keep it."
 - B. Accept the program and add it to your library of marvelous titles.
 - C. Accept it and format over the diskette when you get home.
 - D. Accept it with the idea that you probably will not use it, but keep it "just in case" you decide to buy it later.
- 2. You are on a bulletin board and are scanning the FILES area for a program to download [and] you notice that some of the files are commercial pirated programs. Do you:
 - A. Download the files for your use, telling yourself the responsibility belongs to the BBS sysop?
 - B. Leave a message to the Sysop of your suspicion and names of the files?
 - C. Just download the upgrades to the program that you already own and legally purchased?
 - D. Upload a Virus program to the BBS?
- 3. A friend gives you the telephone number of a "pirate" bulletin board in the area and [tells you] of all the great new commercial programs that you can get for free! Do you:
 - A. Call the bulletin board and download all of your favorite programs before the law finds out and shuts it down?
 - B. Notify the authorities?
 - C. Download your favorite files for yourself, then notify the authorities?
 - D. Ignore the fact that there is a pirate BBS in your area.
- 4. You owe a friend a favor and the friend asks you for a copy of a commercial or copywritten program that you purchased. So, you:
 - A. Make him a copy of the program and promise yourself that it will be the last time you make an illegal copy.
 - B. Tell your friend that you don't think that would be the ethical thing to do.
 - C. Make him a copy as a backup disk since he promised to purchase the program as soon as he gets the money.
 - D. Give him a copy because he is poor and can't afford to buy any good software.

- 5. You are at a computer festival/show and are delighted at all the new stuff for your computer. You are just about to buy a program from a vendor for a good price when a friendly guy takes you aside and says "Let's pitch in together and buy the program, then I'll make us both a copy. It'll be like getting it half-price!" Do you:
 - A. Agree and do as your new friend proposes?
 - B. Tell him "No offense, but I'd rather not."
 - C. Go see if you can find a third person to go in on the deal?
 - D. Try to get it for free from your friend who already has it?
- 6. You download a "shareware" program from a local bulletin board. The document file asks for a donation of \$20 "if you like the program and use it." So you:
 - A. Send the \$20 to the author.
 - B. Decide it's not worth \$20 and send the author \$10 instead.
 - C. Decide that you don't want it, but keep the file in case someone else wants it.
 - D. Use it and promise yourself to send the money later when you are not so busy.
- 7. You go to a user group meeting and at the meeting everyone is trading copies of the hottest game on the market! Do you:
 - A. Take a copy because everyone else is doing it?
 - B. Take a copy because you did not actually make the copy of the disk yourself, so you aren't guilty?
 - C. Refuse a copy and mention the activity to the club president?
 - D. Quit going to user group meetings?
- 8. You buy a copy of a commercial program and one day discover that the diskette no longer works in your computer. A friend offers you a copy of the program that he pirated. What do you do?
 - A. Accept the pirated copy from your friend?
 - B. Refuse the copy and send the original diskette to the publisher for a new disk?
 - C. Pay your friend for replacing your bad diskette?
 - D. Go out and buy the program again from the local store?
- 9. You are the system operator of a local bulletin board system. You get a message one day from a user that there is some pirated software on your BBS. Do you:
 - A. Forget about it? You didn't put them on there!
 - B. Take the software off the BBS and use them yourself.
 - C. Remove the programs from the BBS and discard them? Then, send a message to the uploader warning him of the consequences of doing it again.
 - D. Try to encourage the practice so that everyone will like your BBS more than all the others?
- 10. You have just sold some legitimate—commercial software that you purchased [from] a friend. What do you do with any backup or hard drive copies? Do you:
 - A. Give the backup copies to your friend and delete the files from your hard drive?
 - B. Keep the backup copies in case you need them

someday?

C. Sell the backup copies to someone else and make more money?

D. Continue to use the H.D. copies.

End of Test

Now, let's find out how you did on the test. The answers for the questions are as follows:

- The correct answer is "A." "C" may also be an acceptable answer when confronted with a person who insists that you have it and doesn't understand the meaning of "NO".
 However, you will have the appearance of being a pirate to those who know of the exchange.
- 2. If you picked "B," you are correct! Don't be fooled by "C." Unless the company where you purchased the software offers free upgrades you are obligated to pay the upgrade price required by the company or vendor.
- 3. This question has two possible answers. If you are the type to not sit idle while a crime is being committed, you may deciede to choose "B" and report the activity to the authorities or call the Piracy Hotline set up by the Software Publishers Association. However, if you are the meeker type and don't want to "get anyone into trouble," you may choose "D" and ignore the BBS and discourage its use among your friends.
- 4. "B" is the correct answer here. With "A" and "C" you are only fooling yourself and if you are the easily fooled, I have some swamp land for sale. "D" is a two-edged sword, used by both givers and takers. The truth is; being generous with stolen pirated software does not make you a good Samaritan.
- 5. The correct answer is "B." Let's face it. Going together with a friend and sharing the price of software is dishonest. If you get to keep the original disk does that make the other guy the thief or are you both half-thieves? The fact is that if you made the bargain to share the price of the software, you share ownership 50% by the deal struck. This makes you a half-thief which is a whole lot like being half pregnant! These mind games that we play make it all the harder to run a clean software library. Pretending to not understand the legality of the act is denying the truth to yourself and is no excuse for theft.
- 6. "A" and "C" are proper choices for this question depending upon whether you like the program or not. Since the software author wants the program to get around to as many people as possible, whether by downloading from a BBS or from a friend, "C" is acceptable as long as you do not use the program yourself. "D" is a trap that many of us tend to fall into. We all procrastinate or "put off" things and forget about them. Self-discipline is in order here. When you decide that you like a shareware program, immediately write the check and put it in the mail! There! You did it and it's over with!
- Let's go for answer "C" for this one. If the activity is not condoned by the user group and the club officers are

Support your club, and buy public domain software! unaware of the activity, tell them about it and state your misgivings. If the activity is open and everyone knows it, it would be better to choose "D" and not be a part of a "den of Thieves." Join another user group or create your own to establish good ethical standards in your community. It would probably also be a good idea to contact Bob Brodie at Atari about the club's practices.

- 8. The best answer would be "B," although "A" is OK as long as it is the same version as the copy that you already own. Many software vendors replace damage diskettes for free or a small fee so if in doubt, go "B.
- The answer is "C." Even though you did not put illegal copies of commercial software on your bulletin board, you as the SysOp are legally liable for any pirated software on it. The authorities can confiscate you computer hardware, fine you in court, make you pay damages to the software developers and more! Don't fool yourself here. The lesson you learn can be very expensive.
- 10. "A" of course is the answer. When someone buys a legal copy of a software title from you, he should get the original and he legally is entitled to owning a backup copy now and not you. You should, therefore, delete any copies that are in your possession no matter where they may be stored.

Well, how did you do? You may want to know how this test is scored before you can decide how well you've done. Unlike other tests that allow you to get some of the questions correct to pass, if you have answered any of the previous questions incorrectly, you are a Software Piratel Sounds a little unfair you say? Think about how unfair it would be if you were working for someone and he refused to pay you for your hard work. If this were to happen to you, you would find no deaf ear to your pleas of injustice.

Why should it be any different for software developers? The fact is, it isn't any different! Maybe because of the fact that it is so easy to steal software, and not many people so far have been prosecuted for piracy, pirates have the feeling that "if I can't get caught, it's OK.

Computing should be an activity governed by good ethical conduct. For the Atari ST community, it is much more vital that we understand the obligation that we are under.

We want respect from all other couputer communities, but do we earn any respect?

We want more and more titles to be made available in our computer format, but do we encourage it by stimulating the market demand?

We want more users to join the Atari ranks, but do we foster a good healthy environment for growth?

We want other ST users to be our friends, but do we have to make friends by Stealing?

The Atari ST is a powerful and pleasurable piece of workmanship. Let's be the first to give it and the people who really support it the respect and support they deserve.
