True Atari Confessions

(or: why I now own a Mac)

By now, most everyone involved with NOAH knows that I have moved completely into the Mac world, selling off my Mega ST and all of my Atari software. Since I've never fully explained why I left Atari, I thought I would take the time to lest my reasons for leaving.

First off, let me say that it was a very, very hard decision to make. I took a long time to reach the decision that going Mac was the right thing for me to do. It was an expensive decision, but in the end it benefitted my business greatly. It was my business, that of technical writing, that eventually forced my move into the world of Mac. You see, I regularly crank out huge manuals, loaded with flowchart and scanned images. I could do some of this in PageStream, but then I couldn't generate a table of contents and an index. There wasn't a good ST program that could do good technical publishing. I found a good solution in the form of a Meintosh program, Word Perfect 2.0 for the Mac. It could import (and even create) a wide variety of graphics. It did graphics columns, indexes, figures, and also could export the finished product into WordPerfect 5.1 files for DOS, so that I could supply the finished product in electronic format to my DOScounted clients.

Luckily, this program ran on my Mega ST through the Spectre GCR. The GCR allowed me to change operating system without changing computers. With a little bit of elbow grease (and a few tweaks to my Mega ST's hardware, I have a virtual Macintosh. It was probably about 98% of what a real Mac offers. Problem was that 2% created a whole lot of problems for me. You see, I have a Postscript laser printer, and Macintosh always talk to Postscript laser printer through Appletalk, the Mac's built in networking system. Problem was my Mega ST didn't have Appletalk built in (line real Macs do), so I couldn't take advantage of background printing and other goodies proved by Appletalk. I had to use an out-of-

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24 Hours - 7 Days 3/12/24/96/14.4 v.32bis date, no-longer-support printer driver (Async Laserwriter) that printed through the serial port. This of course, meant I couldn't use a modem and the printer at the same time.

Your see how one small problem cascaded into a mess of them? This was the problem with having a system that was 98% compatible...that remaining 2% often ballooned into much more trouble than it appeared at first.

The straw that broke the camel's back (besides Atari's non-support and lack of new products) was System 7, Apples's new operating system for the Mac. In my opinion, this system defines what a good graphical operating environment should be. It allows multitasking and much more, and most Mac programs are becoming more and more System7(c) dependent. The GCR unfortunately, doesn't run System 7, and it's unclear if it ever will. If I wanted to run System,7 (and I did desperately) I had to get a real Mac. I now own a MacIIci and a PowerBook 100, and am more than satisfied, both with the computers and the company that produces them. Atari used to provide Power without the Price, but with there delays in shipping new products and Apple's lowered prices and wider range of computers, it just didn't make sense for me, as a person who needs a powerful computer, to stick with the hassles and problems of owning an Atari.

Don't get me wrong...the Atari ST is still a viable, useful computer for many people. But just as everybody doesn't drive the same car, so I found I needed something different. It's be nice to see Atari produce as many different computers as Apple does, but somehow I just don't see it happening anytime soon. Which is a real shame.

Falcon030 Bundle -- Marketing Importance By Len Styp

The Falcon030 personal media computer will most likely sell in mass quantities for the purposes of multi-medi and home computing. Atari will have a lot of competition in hese areas from Apple, Commodore, IBM, and the many PC clone manufacturers. The competition is fierce and will continue to get worse as Commodore lowers the price of the Amiga 1200. The "power without the price" slogan will no longer sell computers for Atari because clone manufacturers can sell computers for less. They do not have the added cost of advertising and supporting the computers that they sell. The Falcon030 and any other personal computer that Atari manufactures needs an advantage. And the only advantage that Atari can possibly offer is support.

Atari's system designers worked hard to make the Falcon030 "exciting", "fun to use", and "different than the ordinary boring PC." Atari's management must have felt that another ordinary boring PC would not cut it in the world

today. And they are right. If a company plans to release a non-PC clone computer on the market, the computer better be pretty damn special. But this is not enough. In order for the computer to be a success, the company has to give the consumer something more. Something that very few computer manufacturers are giving consumers. This something is support and it should be given to them along with the purchase of their computer.

Atari is presently planning to bundle the Falcon030 with eight applications. These are: Audio Fun Machine, FalconD2D, System Audio Manager, ProCale, Talking Clock, CalAppt, BreakOut, and LandMines. There is nothing wrong with this software. The problem is that Atari is missing some very important things in this bundle.

The Falcon030 is easy to use and will be a great attraction to people that know very little about computers. The consumer will purchase the Falcon030, hook it all up, and then turn it on. The next thing that he or she will do is sit in front of the monitor and stare. But what if the consumer purchased a Macintosh or Amiga instead? He or she would hook it all up, turn it on, and then place the "Tutorial" disk into the computer and the computer would teach them how to use it. I am not aware of any "Tutorial" disk included in Atari's bundle that will teach the inexperienced computer user how to use the Falcon030. I remember when computer buyer guides were comparing the Amiga 500 to the Atari 1040STe, they recommended the Amiga over the ST for the beginner because of the "Tutorial" disk. The reviewers commented that even though the STe had a graphics operating system, most people did not know how to use it. If one of the Falcon030's markets is the home computer market, it would only make sense to include a tutorial disk.

The software that Atari is presently planning to include with the Falcon030 is gadget software. This software is nice to play around with, but you cannot do anything productive with it. The home computer user will want to start seeing REAL uses for the computer as soon as he or she purchases it. The "Atari Works" package that includes a word processor, database, and spreadsheet would be a perfect productivity package to include with the new computer. The computer would be fully functional unlike other personal computers that are sold without productivity software. In the past, Atari would have sold this package separately from their computers.

As soon as the home computer user gets tired of using the software that was included with the computer, he or she will want to make their own software. A programming language that a user can write programs with only seems natural to include with a personal computer.

The Falcon030 bundle is also missing an Atari product catalog. Remember the 800XL? A full-color computer and hardware catalog was included with it. The catalog lets you

know about other Atari products and informed you of what hardware you could buy for your new computer. If you purchased a 1040 STe today, you would see a sketch of the hardware available for it inside of the user manual. I do not know about you, but the laser printer sketch inside of this manual does not make my mouth water for it. A full-color system and hardware catalog would make even more sense if Atari bundles the "Atari Works" package. The user is going to need a printer and if he or she sees an Atari printer in this catalog, they might be interested in getting it.

What software is available? This is going to be the question on the minds of almost every new Falcon030 owner. The including of the "International Software Catalog" with the Falcon030 bundle would also be a very smart move. The catalog will impress the new Falcon030 owner with the many software titles available for their computer. The catalog will also increase sales of Atari's loyal third-party developers. Atari could include the software catalog as a "thank you" to developers for being there when the company needed them.

The Falcon030 could be bundled with ten sheets of paper listing all of the Atari user groups in North America. The present user groups in the North America are extremely small and unless something is done by Atari, there will not be any user groups left. The including of a list of user groups in North America would let Atari user groups know that Atari cares about them. The including of this list would also be a "thank you" to user groups for sticking around all of this time. The list would have to be updated since the last list because many user groups no longer exist. The same thing can be done for Atari Dealerships in North America. There are very few dealerships left and a list of "Official Atari Dealerships" would certainly help those that have remained so long.

In the past, Atari has always included a subscription card for Atari Explorer Magazine. In the future, it would be nice to see Atari include subscription cards for ALL Atari magazines. Most of these publications have been around for the longest times, even when other magazines left because there was no money to be made with Atari. I believe that Atari owes it to these publications for sticking around even when they were not making any profit. The adding of subscription cards would also benefit Atari. How many people do you estimate will sell their Falcon when they have four different Atari subscriptions? Atari could also do the same for online computer services that support Atari.

Since many recent Atari owners are complaining that they are having a hard time getting their computers fixed under the 1-year warranty, Atari may want to include a "Customer Satisfaction" sheet. The sheet would explain how Atari will pick up the owner's computer from them free of charge and repair it within one week. Commodore has a similar warranty system and I do not see why Atari cannot match it. The GE Service Deal does not seem to be happening

and until it does, this seems like a good way to satisfy customers.

Since many of the new Falcon030 owners will be inexperienced with computers, Atari could include a sheet of paper with an "Atari Support" 1-800 phone number on it. The phone number will give people the support that they need. This is the advantage of buying a Falcon030 computer over a PC clone. A helpful Atari representative on the other line will help the Falcon030 owner with anything they need.

A gift catalog can be included that shows Atari shirts, sweatshirts, hats, coffee mugs, bumper stickers, pins, etc. Sierra sells tons of these things every year and there is no doubt that Atari can do the same. Atari Corporation can receive a lot of exposure with people wearing a Falcon bird on the front of a shirt with the words "Atari Falcon Computers." The same thing with bumper stickers.

The Falcon030 could also be shipped with demo disks. How many of you invite friends over to see your Atari computer? If Atari included a fantastic demo of the Falcon030's capabilities, I'll bet every Falcon owner would be showing everyone what their bird can do. All it takes is one very impressive demonstration to make a sale. One of the demos could advertise the Atari Lynx. A person that never thought of buying the Lynx can suddenly become interested in it because of one good demo.

And lastly, the Falcon030 bundle could include a blank floppy disk. How many times have people purchased computers without thinking of buying a blank floppy? Atari can show the new Falcon030 owner that the company thinks of everything.

Atari Corporation will be delayed in shipping large quantities of the Falcon030 until March. Maybe Atari can use this time to make the Falcon030 bundle just as impressive as the Falcon. A very good product without the right kind of marketing is the same as a terrible product.

First they have continued to upgrade their current products such as Hotwire, Multidesk Deluxe, and Maxfile, while adding Looklt and PopIt of their own and then obtaining rights to Quick ST and transforming it into the new product Warp 9. There are quite a few more products which are being upgraded now, or being brought over from Europe which I haven't mentioned in this article. Most of them are being discussed in our monthly commercial publications ST Informer, Atari User, ST Connection. Atari Advantage, Current Notes and Atari Explorer.

The products discussed in this article show that the after market software producers are supporting the Atari ST market. I did not discuss the hardware products, but there are quite a large number of them too. Now if Atari will just produce the new computers that they have just introduced or are just about to introduced into the market palace in large enough quantities and then advertise them, the future will look very bright for the Atari ST user.

Calligrapher 3

CodeHead Technologies and Working Title US have announced the release of Calligrapher 3, a graphics-based word processor capable of running on all ST/STe, TT030 and Falcon030 computers. There are two versions of the program: Calligrapher Professional, requiring 1 Mb of memory, and Calligrapher Gold, requiring 1 Mb of memory and a hard disk. The difference between these versions is in the optional PAKS (program modules) included in the package. The Calligrapher program is the same in both versions.

Several enhancements have been implemented to make installation quicker, easier and less trouble-prone. The functionality of G+Callig (a GDOS replacement) and Line_Arc have been built directly into Calligrapher 3 and they can be removed from the AUTO folder. In addition, the new installation program utilizes a GEM dialog box and is more intelligent; filling all available memory before writing to disk to minimize disk swapping.

A new program allows you to alter Calligrapher's internal setup including memory used, the printer supported and other internal settings. You can reduce the memory used by Calligrapher to make it compatible with multitasking operating systems such as MultiGem and MultiTOS. This program also allows two printers to be supported at the same time, making it possible to switch between them at print time.

Users with 2Mb of memory and a hard disk will be able

to take advantage of intelligent screen font cacheing to display vector fonts on the screen. These can speed up the screen display when opening and moving through documents. And with the new document template files (files with a CAT extension) this speed will be needed. This new file type allows you to pre-define your ruler settings and utilize this guideline for your documents. Calligrapher prompts you for a new file name before saving, so you do not overwrite the template.

With the release of Calligrapher 3 you can now use any URW font (the existing fonts must be re-installed with the new program included in upgrades). Calligrapher 3 owners can also use any of the twenty new fonts available from URW. These fonts are not compatable with current versions of Calligrapher and should only be ordered if you have Calligrapher 3. The new fonts (and their order numbers) are:

The ability to use URW fonts in the FlexText module means that GDOS fonts—and therefore GDOS itself—are no longer supported in Calligrapher 3. Since the FlexText module requires GDOS and Line_Arc, it is no longer possible to run the FlexText module as a stand alone application; it must be run as a PAK within Calligrapher 3 in order to operate properly. Changes have been made to the FlexText module in order to reduce the amount of memory it consumes.

The integral symbol and brackets in Calligrapher's mathematical formulae have been improved and new commands added to cover set symbols, and things such as products. Keyboard shortcuts for the the interactive formula editor, including the new commands, have also been added.

Additional features of Calligrapher 3 are:

- o Supports Epson dot matrix printers that support 360dpi compressed mode (Esc-P2 printers).
- o Supports 1.44Mb disk drives.
- o The FlexText module now allows you to use any URW typeface.
- o On a TT, Calligrapher now moves its code into TT RAM to run 30% faster.
- o Importing and exporting of Rich Text Format (RTF) files has been added to the import module.
- o A vertical line is displayed when adjusting ruler markers (margins, tabs, etc) to gauge position.
- o Proportionally increase or decrease the font size of marked text.

- A separation line has been added between footnotes and the body of text.
- o Calligrapher 3 remembers the pathname when inserting multiple—graphics into a document.
- o A triple click on a paragraph selects the whole paragraph.
- o While using a multitasking operating system, the clipboard function—saves to disk allowing you to cut and paste text dynamically between applications.
- o The supplementary language disks have been improved. Spanish includes a Catalan dictionary and a Spanish thesaurus. German has a German dictionary and thesaurus. Italian has a Catalan dictionary.

In order to make these improvements to Calligrapher 3, some features existing in version 2.28 have been replaced. If any of these features are essential for your needs, you should not upgrade. Alternately, you should create a copy of the fully installed version of Calligrapher you are currently using so that you do not lose these features when upgrading to Calligrapher 3.

The features that are no longer available in Calligrapher 3 are:

- o Bitmap GDOS printer fonts are no longer supported. Only URWoutline—fonts will be printed.
- o Sizefont, Editfont, and Assign Edit are no longer relevant without GDOS.
- o The ability to print to disk in PTD format has been removed, along with DiskPrnt.

Current owners of Calligrapher can upgrade to this version for \$45. Any Calligrapher 2 Professional users wishing to upgrade to the the Calligrapher 3 Gold version can do so for \$100. This upgrade is available to all users who have purchased the Working Title US (Codellead) version of Calligrapher and has received a registered Disk 5. Shipping and handling charges for the upgrade are \$3 US, \$4 Canada, and \$6 overseas.

Users who upgrade to Calligrapher 3 are also entitled to one free URW outline font disk (worth 34.95) an may choose from any of the existing or new fonts. As an added incentive, while upgrading you can purchase additional URW outline font disks for only \$25. But this offer only applies to fonts purchased when you upgrade to the latest version of Calligrapher.

JOUST 1-2 players, horizontal game Shadowsoft, for the Atari Lynx \$39.95 Stereo? No

OVERVIEW: It's arguable who made the best video games in the early days of arcadegaming, but one firm commanded awe from all players: Williams. Their earlygames had simple rules, lots of strategy, and a take-no-prisoners challengethat only the best could master. JOUST for the Lynx is a version of the Williams classic title. The player rides a flying ostrich, engaging in combatagainst enemy riders. Two riders joust by colliding, and the winner is the onewhose lance is higher. The arena is a cavern of platforms, which can be walkedon or flown around.

A few extra wrinkles make the game more interesting. Defeated enemies turninto eggs, which hatch into more aggressive fliers if they're not retrieved intime. Later levels introduce the lava troll who snatches riders overhead, anearly-indestructible pterodactyl, and vanishing platforms. Two players canplay together with the ComLynx cable, working cooperatively or competitively. Some stages have special bonuses, such as extra points for not losing a life, or for unseating your partner first. You start with three riders, with extrasal regular intervals, and once they're gone, the game ends.

GAMEPLAY: This title is from Shadowsoft, the same folks who gave us their incredibleLynx version of ROBOTRON: 2084 a year ago. I don't need to say much -- if youliked JOUST in the arcade, you'll love the Lynx version! It's a perfect, flawless translation that loses absolutely none of the original's depth and excitement. What starts off as a simple exercise in dismounting opponents soon becomes organized chaos. Your character is soon assaulted by riders on allsides, with more aggressive enemies hatched and on the way, and a pterodacty lready to assault you for taking too long.

This conversion also has a few extra features. There are ten difficulty levels, where more aggressive enemies appear sooner and hatch quicker at the harder settings. With two players, you can also play in "gladiator mode", where you configure the arena, then try to destroy your opponent completely. Throw in a high score table to track the top five players, and you've got a "must buy" Lynx game for action/arcade fans.

GRAPHICS/SOUND: The sights and sounds of JOUST are just as faithful to the source. The Lynx screen resolution causes a slight loss of detail, but nothing to getupset over. The sprites are small but easily recognizable, with animation, color, and visuals copied exactly in every detail. Similarly, almost all of the sounds have been digitized or duplicated exactly. I only noticed one soundeffect from the original that has not been copied, but other than that, it's all here.

SUMMARY: JOUST is another unbelievably excellent product from Shadowsoft. Playerswho never played the arcade title will be captivated by its simple rules, deepstrategy, and fast action, while the legions of arcade JOUST fans will be invideo-gaming heaven!


