Phil's Ramblings

It used to be that you could find a wide selection of computer-centric magazines on the rack at your local bookstore. While there are still quite a few, their numbers are shrinking as publishers give up on print subscriptions. These publishers may have offered an online version of their magazine in the past, as a supplement to the print version. Now – presumably because of cost pressures – they are offering only an online version.

Two magazines that I used to receive through print subscriptions ("PC World" and "PC Magazine") are among those which have made this transition. Now, I have online subscriptions to both through Zinio, an online mAagazine subscription provider. They are among literally hundreds of online subscriptions offered by Zinio in a variety of genres. The good news is that I can now read these magazines on virtually any desktop, laptop, tablet or phone by logging onto Zinio with my account user name and password.

If you have fond memories of either and wish to subscribe I encourage you to go to www.zinio.com and do so. The normal one-year subscription rate for each is approximately \$20; however, they do run specials from time to time so it is worth getting on the Zinio email list. (As of this writing (February 4th) Zinio is offering a two-year subscription to PC Magazine for the price of one.)

But there is a cheaper option for LCACE members who happen to live in the Cook or Grayslake Library Districts. Both libraries offer a range of Zinio magazines for free download to library members through their eLibrary offerings. In the case of Cook, they offer both PC World and PC Magazine, as well as iPhone Life, Macworld and Apple Magazine. Grayslake offers Apple Magazine, Macworld and PC Magazine. Unfortunately, as far as I can tell, Waukegan Library District does not offer Zinio magazines to its members.

Speaking of computer-centric publications, there are a lot of changes coming to the Windows Secrets newsletter. Those who are current subscribers will have already received the news through the January 12th & 14th issues; here is some information for those who may be considering a subscription or who are not familiar with this publication.

This newsletter began in 2004 with the merger of two existing Windows-oriented newsletters, the oldest of which, "Woody's Windows Watch" had been founded in 1998 by Woody Leonhard. (Woody is currently listed as Editor Emeritus of Windows Secrets.) The new Windows Secrets newsletter started out with about 140,000 subscribers.

In 2006, Fred Langa merged his "LangaList" newsletter into Windows Secrets, upping the circulation to about 290,000. Fred remains as the Senior Editor of Windows Secrets today. In 2008, the "Support Alert Newsletter" joined the fold, bringing the total subscription list to over 400,000.

Today, Windows Secrets is part of the Penton Technology Group, which includes a sister publication, "SuperSite for Windows". The current Editor-in-Chief is Trace Capen, who has an extensive background with PC World, InfoWorld and Corporate Computing magazines.

In the past Windows Secrets newsletter offered an abridged free version and a full paid version by email every two weeks. The suggested cost for the annual paid subscription was \$12. Now, apparently because of cost pressures, they have moved to a paid subscription only. This revised newsletter will now appear in subscribers' email twice a week – on Tuesday and Thursdays. Readers will have to click over to their website to get

Video Grabbe Full Media Recorder

Easy way to save your treasures to video format

Recently, I've come across a VHS tape of my son in a 1982 performance of Sneaky Finch at Waukegan East High School and I wanted to digitize it and send it to him. In my research, I can across a few different solutions until Digit Now Media Record panned out to be the device that fit my needs.

DitgitNow Media Recorder is a easy way to record or convert video and audio from almost any source (VHS or camcorder) and play it back on almost any device. I was able to digitize my old VHS



tapes to a memory card with the press of one button! The integrated display allows you to see in real time what is being transferred. There is no need for a computer because you file is save to a memory card which can then be transfer to you PC to save to a CD or DVD. Files are saved in a AVI format which I was able to import into my video editing program and create an archival DVD, upload your old videos to YouTube or even put your video on your smartphone or tablet!

Just connect the video source with a RCA cable. The video is stored on a microSD card, During the transfer you can Press a button and take a SnapShot of the screen. Every-

thing can be displayed instantly on your TV by connecting the Video Grabber via AVor HDMI. The recorder has a build-in battery for up to 4-hour of record time.

The Video Grabber comes with AV Cable, USB cable 4GB MicroSD Card and a 4.5V power adapter. The Media Recorder can be found online for about \$100.
