New Microsoft Office is coming!

Don't wat to subscribe to Microsoft 365? Don't worry: Consummers and small business will be able to buy Office 2021 as a one-time purchase this fall, the same time Windows 11 launches. Here's what to know.

Microsoft's new, flat-price version of its Office productivity software will arrive on Oct. 5 -- the same day Windows 11 begins rolling out, according to a company blog post Thursday.

Microsoft previously emphasized that while its main focus remains in its subscription offering, Microsoft 365, it will release the one-time purchase Office 2021 for those who aren't ready to move to the cloud.

Office 2021 arrives in two versions: one for commercial users, called Office LTSC (which stands for Long Term Servicing Channel), and one for personal use. Office LTSC is generally available today, the post said, and includes enhanced accessibility features, performance improvements across Word, Excel and

PowerPoint, and visual improvements, like dark mode support across apps. It's meant for specialty situations, as opposed to for an entire organization, such as process control devices on the manufacturing floor that are not connected to the internet.

Meanwhile, Office 2021 for personal use will arrive on Oct. 5, though Microsoft has not yet announced pricing information.

Both versions of Office will be supported on Windows and Mac, and will ship with the OneNote app. They will also ship both 32- and 64-bit versions, according to the post. Microsoft will support the soft-



What would happen if I ate my computer? Asking for a friend.



The Guinness book of world records <u>states</u> that Michel Lotito died at age 57, of natural causes. But not before this competitive eater had consumed 18 bicycles, 15 supermarket carts, seven TV sets, six chandeliers, two beds, a pair of skis, a low-calorie Cessna light aircraft, and a computer.

First things first: No nutritionist, doctor, or even the trendiest of dieters would recommend or applaud eating a computer. But it begs a ridiculous yet perhaps equally intriguing question: Is consuming one really that dangerous? Many of the same metals that are found inside electronic devices—magnesium, iron, and sodium—are also found inside the human body. In the event of a dare, would consumption be possible?

Unfortunately, the benefits of eating a computer do not come close to outweighing the risks, many of which include death. The first potential peril is the choking hazard. Even competitive eaters have been unable to swallow much softer foods. In fact, last year, two Nathan's contestants died after choking on a doughnut and a pancake, respectively, according to Metro News. Silicon and fiberglass are much harder to gulp down. Even Lotito cut his metallic meals into pieces that were one to two centimeters long. On top of that, anything that is long or sharp has the potential to scratch or tear the eater's esophagus, the long tube that connects the mouth to the stomach.

If you did somehow manage (like Lotito did) to pulverize the computer and then swallow it without issue, heavy metal poisoning would be your next obstacle. Circuit boards sometimes contain tiny amounts of arsenic — not enough to kill you immediately, but if you ate several computers, the dose would add up. Aluminum, a common component found in the casings of both the computer and its hard drive, has no biological function in the human body and seems to gum up normal body processes. Some case reports have described that people in the end stages of liver disease who are no longer able to flush aluminum out of of their bodies suffer nerve damage, presumably from the metal. Older computer monitors also contain up to eight pounds of lead, as well as mercury, arsenic, cadmium, and beryllium, according to the Long Island manufacturing center, a recycling and e-waste dropoff site.

Most people are aware that lead isn't great for you—immediate side effects can include nausea, vomiting, and abdominal pain. If the lead poisoning continues, the victim can eventually die, typically from kidney failure. In 2006, a child died after swallowing a small lead charm—eating an entire computer's worth of the metal is a viable way of ingesting enough to kill. So how did Lotito survive? In the child's case, the lead charm got stuck in the kid's stomach, where acids slowly broke it down. If it hadn't, the piece of metal would have passed through the digestive system guickly and would have caused less damage, according to Helen Binns, a professor of pediatrics and preventative medicine at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine. "If you had a fishhook that got stuck in your intestines, that would cause problems," she says. "If you swallow a bead or something like that, it just passes through your bowel."

But metals aren't the only form of toxic indigestion you might endure. The optical drive, the part that allows you to read CDs (unless you have a new Mac), is covered with a light-sensitive substance called a photoresist application. Studies have shown that this doesn't seem to be very good for lab animals, though it was not fatal. When scientists gave it to mice and rabbits, it caused inflammation around their eyes and skin, as well as weight gain.

The flame retardants that keep your electronics from easily combusting are not delicious or nutritious, either. These substances surround the computer's copper wires and drift into the atmosphere if burned or crushed as waste. In addition to disrupting fertility, some evidence suggests these flame retardant chemicals might also disrupt human hormone systems, according to the National Institute of Health, and some studies have shown a correlation between certain types of flame retardant and cancer.

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Best VPN

A virtual private network can help maximize your security and anonymity online.



Whether you're <u>working remotely</u> or you simply want to keep your <u>information safe from prying eyes</u>, a VPN is key. Here's how it works: A VPN encrypts the connection between you and the internet, keeping your data secure and your browsing habits private.

However, there are a multitude of VPN providers to choose from, and not every VPN service offers the same level of security, reliability and <u>speed</u>. That can make it tricky to find the best VPN service to meet your particular needs. Our best VPN guide is here to help.

What is a VPN?

A commercial virtual private network is technology that allows you to create a private connection over a less private network by creating an encrypted tunnel between your computer and the internet. You can <u>install a VPN just like you would any other app</u> or program on your smartphone or computer. A VPN can let you get around censorship in your country or access geo-restricted media content from another country -- and prevents your internet service provider from being able to intrude on your privacy by snooping on your web browsing. VPNs do this by allowing you to appear as though you're connecting from a different location or country.

A <u>VPN</u> is great for anyone using public, unprotected Wi-Fi, such as what's offered in airports, bars or coffee shops. Your VPN protects your sensitive information -- from your work projects to bank account login information -- from being seen by malicious actors who trawl public Wi-Fi networks. When you browse the internet while on a VPN, your computer will contact the website through your VPN's encrypted connection. The VPN will then forward the request for you and forward the response from the website back through its secure connection.

For more beginner-focused VPN help, we've demystified some of the jargon in our guide to <u>all the VPN</u> terms you need to know.

Do I need a VPN?

People who access the internet from a computer, tablet or smartphone will benefit from VPN usage. A VPN service will almost always boost your privacy by encrypting your online activity. Communications that happen between the VPN server and your device are encrypted, so an internet service provider or someone on your Wi-Fi network spying on you wouldn't know which webpages you access. They also won't be able to see private information like passwords, usernames and bank or shopping details and so on. Anyone who wants to protect their privacy and security online should use a VPN. Does everything I use need a VPN? If your goal is to protect your personal data from prying eyes, you want a VPN on whatever you are using. That means having a VPN to protect your laptop, your phone, your Xbox and your smart TV.

If your goal is to use a VPN to gain access to streaming services which have been made unavailable in your country for whatever reason, you want a VPN on whatever you are using to access those streaming services. This could be as simple as a <u>VPN for your Chrome browser</u> or <u>setting up a VPN for your Amazon Fire TV Stick</u>.

Whatever your reason for wanting a VPN, it's usually a good idea to have it set up on as many of your web-connected things as possible.

What is a mobile VPN?

Use a mobile-friendly VPN to avoid slower speeds and ensure greater data privacy for your whole device. Mobile VPNs generally have a smaller memory footprint, and require less processing power than desktop VPNs, so they run faster and save more battery. Our top three VPN picks all have excellent, easy-to-use mobile app options for their services. Some VPNs will only work with one type of platform -- like Apple or Android -- and some are universally compatible. To find the right mobile VPN for you, check out our mobile-specific VPN guides below. We routinely update them with our retesting information, so

ware for five years, and said it does not plan to change the price at the time of release. In April 2020, Microsoft transitioned Office 365 into Microsoft 365, a subscription service that added more features to the suite of software tools, but required a monthly payment of \$7 for an individual plan or \$10 for a family of up to six people (that price will be increasing in March 2022). The company said that its main focus will continue to be on the cloud, but it understands that not everyone is ready to take that step. While you can use Microsoft 365 apps like Word, PowerPoint and Excel online for free with limited functionality, you'll need either a perpetual version or a subscription to take full advantage of their capabilities.

Some wondered if Office 2019 would be the last perpetual version of the software, since Microsoft 365 came along. But then Microsoft announced its plan for a perpetual release of Office in a September blog post.

Left click on an empty area of your computer **Desktop**. When the Menu pops up, click on **New**, then Shortcut. The Create Shortcut Dialog box will open. Type this in the box %windir%\system32 \shutdown.exe /s /f /t 0. This tells Windows to force any open applications to close and to shutdown with minimum delay. Click **Next** in the dialog box. Name your shortcut **Shutdown** or whatever you wish. Click **Finish**. Your shortcut should appear on your desktop. The shortcut will have a default icon. Right click on the shortcut and click on **Properties**. Click the Change Icon button. You will get a default warning message. Click the **OK** button. A list of icons should appear. Double click on the icon you want (you know the one). Click **Apply** or **OK**. Drag your shortcut to the Quicklaunch area of your taskbar to make a one-click shutdown or leave it on your **Desktop** for a two-click shutdown.



Eating computers, though still not safe, has become less deadly over time. The European Union banned cadmium and lead from computers in 2006 and newer circuit boards are less likely to contain arsenic. In 2009, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers created environmental guidelines that companies and institutions can adhere to, and the even more recent Green Electronics Council grades companies according to how recyclable they are. However, old computers still turn up at recycling centers. "Sometimes people will hold onto things for a long time — we get 40 or 50 year old TVs," says Jason Linnell, executive director at the National Center of Electronics Recycling. "They might have the lead, the mercury, cadmium. These are the types of materials that you want to prevent from going into the landfill."

In the future, humans may eat computers on purpose. Right now scientists are developing nanocomputers that patients will be able to swallow like a pill. These tiny robots will be able to monitor your vital signs from the inside, and may also, in the future, be able to fill in one of your hundred hard-to-remember passwords. Prototypes already exist for people like astronauts, firefighters, and football players, whose caretakers want to make sure they do not overheat. Scientists are working on developing computers that are more biodegradable — like this computer chip made of woodbased nanocellulose.

Since most of us lack Lotito's steel-crushing stomach, recycling is the much more appealing (and safer) option. "Things have definitely gotten better," says Linnell. "We have a lot more well-qualified recyclers." In some cities, you can even be fined for putting old computers in the pile with normal trash. Instead, many manufacturers take back old products and many cities offer <u>e-wastedeposit locations</u>. There is no need to eat your computer.

How to set up a VPN on your iPhone or Android phone, and why you need one

What's the best free VPN?

None of them. <u>Seriously</u>. While there are plenty of excellent free security and privacy apps online, VPNs sadly aren't among them. Safe VPNs cost companies a lot of money to operate and keep secure, and free ones are almost always malware-laden data snoops. But there's good news: The burgeoning VPN market is hypercompetitive right now, so prices for even the best VPNs regularly drop to less than \$5 a month. In fact, the least expensive VPN we've seen so far ranks in our top three VPNs overall for security and speed. Check out our <u>quick list of budget-savvy VPNs</u> to find one in your price range.

How do I choose the right VPN for me?

We're keeping a close eye on how each VPN provider stands compared with its competitors, as well as any new VPN services that may become available. We've cataloged our most recommended VPN services to date -- and listed some less viable VPN selections, too, based on our testing. We'll be regularly updating this VPN guide as new contenders hit the market. That said, the VPN landscape can be confusing and mystifying. Here are some quick tips, each of which link to a more in-depth discussion.

<u>Don't use free VPN services</u>: You'll find only paid VPN options below because they're the only ones we can recommend.

Look for a no-logs VPN, but understand the caveats: The best VPNs keep as few logs as possible and make them as anonymous as possible, so there's little data to provide should authorities come knocking. But even "no -logs" VPNs aren't 100% anonymous.

VPN transparency is important, but warrant canaries are only the beginning: Many services use "warrant canaries" as a way to passively note to the public as to whether or not they've been subpoenaed by a government entity, as many investigations from national security agencies can't be actively disclosed by law. But -- like the no-logging issue -- warrant canaries aren't always as straightforward as they seem. You should spend more time investigating whether your prospective VPN has cooperated with authorities in the past -- and how and when it's disclosed that fact.

Think twice about using a US-based VPN: The Patriot Act is still the law of the land in the US, and that means US-based VPNs have little recourse if and when the feds show up with subpoenas or national security letters in hand demanding access to servers, VPN user

accounts or other data. Yes, they may have little data to access if the service has a strong no-logs policy, but why not just choose a service that's based outside Uncle Sam's jurisdiction? (If this is a concern for you, you'll want to avoid countries that the US has intelligence-sharing agreements with, too.)

After researching and testing a number of VPN services, we rounded up a list of the VPN providers that do the best job in keeping your online information totally secure. When determining the best VPN, there are a lot of details to consider. In our current ranking and testing system, we evaluated more than 20 factors, including price, security, performance, ease of remote access, number of server locations, bandwidth caps, logging, dedicated and dynamic IP, client VPN software and customer support. Below, we've listed your best VPN options, including such popular names as ExpressVPN, Surfshark, IPVanish and NordVP N.

The best VPN right now

Let's look at each of our VPN vendors below in more depth. Keep in mind that this is an evolving list: It's constantly being updated. We're actively working on more VPN testing and research, so expect this guide to change throughout the year as our VPN use continues and we put each option through its paces.

Patriot Power Cell

Designed to make sure you smart devices are never without power.

While watching TV and this product caught my interest, so I did a little investigating before jumping onboard. What really caught my eye was this is a solar power device which I could use as an emergency power back up while traveling. Although I have several other power banks, they all rely on being pugged in and charged before travel. That is where a power bank, solar charging phone bank, or in this case the Patriot Power Cell come in handy.

The Patriot charge holds enough power in its compact unit to charge my iPhone 3 – 6 time or charge my iPad 2 times. Although one charge would be sufficient for an all day or even a weekend trip. All this depends on how much I use the device during this time frame.

Built into the Patriot power cell are 2 USB ports so I can charge two devices at once. A few times I have changed my iPhone and iPad at the same time.

To make the Patriot power cell more appealing, it also has a LEC flashlight – it is bright too, so you will not be left to find in the dark. Besides having a constant flashlight mode, it also has an SOS setting. This

would truly help if I got into a position where I need emergency assistance.

There are 4 blue LED meter lights to inform you of the state of charge, each represent the state of charge. Therefore, when I only have one light left, I know the bank has 25% battery left. The Patriot has a high rating for water-resistance and will withstand splashes as well as rain. It is also designed to protect against drops. The batteries are lithium polymer and have passed TSA regulations.

Three are other power cells out there with more power, but just how much do you need? The Patriot has a capacity of 8,000 mAh, charge time of 6 hours, via USB charging/40 hours in the sun. The USB output is 1A 5V DC, /2.1A, and the service life of this device is 500-time charging, 5-6 years.

KardiMobile EKG Monitor

How to Organize All Your iCloud Photos

If you have thousand of photos piling up, here's how to keep them backed up and organized



One of the great things about iCloud is that you can store lots of pictures. One of the *bad* things about iCloud is that you can store lots of pictures. Here are some tips to help you back up and organize all your thousands of photos without doing too much sifting through memories of Halloween 2017.

To back up the photos somewhere besides the cloud, open up the Photos app on your Mac. Then open Preferences, and select the iCloud tab. On that page, select "Download originals to this Mac". That will save all your photos locally to your computer. If you want to add an external hard drive for extra safety, you can use third-party software like Backblaze, or your Mac's built-in Time Machine function, which will back up the rest of your computer as well. To manually move all the photos over, just plug in your hard drive, open Finder, go to Pictures, and drag the Photos Library over to the new hard drive.

If you'd like to organize your photos so they are easier to navigate, go to iCloud.com and log in with your AppleID. Then select Photos and click the plus sign at the top to create and name a new album. With the new album created, simply select one or multiple photos, and click the plus sign again to select where you'd like to send them.

Nationwide, in May 2021, people under 44 years of age made up a majority of cases – 65 percent. And those 12 to 29 years old were about half of that number.* So, being young and generally healthy obviously doesn't make a person immune from contracting COVID□19.

You can take steps now to protect yourself, your family and friends, and your community.

- 2. Wear a mask in public indoor settings
- 3. Keep your hands clean
- 4. Maintain six feet or more of distance Unvaccinated people are at greater risk. 

Scam alert:

Beware the dangerous

'Cellular Carrier Loyalty Giveaway' scam



As you probably know by now, the scammers of the world are always coming up with new ways to separate innocent people from their hard-earned money.

Since the dawn of the World Wide Web, most phishing scams have been perpetrated via email, but that's beginning to change.

While email is still the primary vehicle for delivering these types of scams, a relatively new generation of scams are now arriving in the form of SMS text messages.

What makes these text scams so dangerous is the fact that most people aren't used to seeing scams being delivered this way.

Also, in most cases the scammer knows which cellular carrier you use (your phone number is a major clue) so they reference your actual carrier in the message.

If you want to see how easy it is for a scammer to find out who your cellular carrier is, just follow the steps below for the device you're using.

If you're using a laptop or desktop computer:

- 1 Open a web browser and visit <u>Area-Codes.com</u>.
- 2 Enter your phone number's **Area Code** & **Prefix**.

Note: You don't need to enter the last four digits of your phone number, just the area code and prefix.

3 – Click the **Search** button.

If you're using smartphone:

- 1 Open a web browser and visit Area-Codes.com.
- 2 Tap Area Code and Prefix search.

3 – Enter your phone number's **Area Code** & **Prefix**.

Note: You don't need to enter the last four digits of your phone number, just the area code and prefix.

4 – Tap the **Lookup Area Code & Prefix** button.

Pretty simple, right?

While the details vary a bit, most of these "loyalty thank-you" scams work like this:

You receive a text message on your phone that appears to be from your cellular carrier.

The message begins by thanking you for being a loyal customer, then it says you qualify to receive a cash payout as a thank-you.

The amounts mentioned in these messages vary, but most people are reporting that the messages they received had the amount listed as \$200.

According to the message, all you have to do in order to "claim" the thank-you gift is to tap a link in the message.

Once you tap the link your phone's default browser will open displaying a website with a form to enter your banking info. They have to have some way to send you your money, right?

Well, there are several red flags that indicate that these messages are fraudulent.

First, the link in the message will be a shortened link (via Bitly or one of the other popular link shortening services). That obscures the fact that the URL of the page does not reside on the carrier's official website.

Second, why would your cellular carrier need your banking info? All they would need to do is apply a \$200 credit to your account like they routinely do when they offer legitimate promotions.

Beware this dangerous fake Windows security alert

ell, it's another day, and yet another dangerous recurring scam is rearing its ugly head yet again.

This scam first made its appearance way back in 2016 and then it quickly went into hiding. Now it's back.

Unfortunately, this exploit is extremely easy to fall for because it looks almost exactly like the real Microsoft Windows error messages that we're used to seeing from time to time.

Your PC ran into a problem and needs to restart. We're just collecting some error info, and then we'll restart for you. (0% complete)

If you'd like to know more, you can search online later for this error. HAL INITIALIZATION, FAILED if you'd like to resolve the issue over the phone you can call our support at 1-800-418-4202

Microsoft refers to this scam as Hicurdismos, and it works like this:

- 1 A fake error message that mimics a typical Windows BSOD (Blue Screen of Death) pops up on your screen. This is what it looks like:
- 2 If you call the 800 number at the bottom of the error message you'll talk to a scammer posing as a Microsoft Tech Support rep. The fake rep will try to talk you into downloading a software tool that will sup-

posedly fix the error for you.

Of course in actuality, there is no error to fix. The download is actually additional malware.

There are two things that I recommend you keep in mind at all times:

- 1 If this message ever pops up on your PC it will mean that your computer has already been infected with malware. If so, I recommend that you run the malware scans mentioned in this post.
- 2 Real Windows error messages don't include contact information for "Support" such as the 800 number listed at the bottom of the fake BSOD you see above. Such contact information in a BSOD error message is a dead giveaway that the message is a scam.

Bottom line: Hackers and scammers are getting better at their deceitful craft all the time. That's why it pays to always be on guard and question everything you see online and on your computer screen.

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Windows 11 available on October 5

Microsoft finally confirmed the official release date for Windows 11. The latest version of Microsoft's operating system will make its public debut on October 5th, 2021. As was previously announced, Windows 11 will be a free upgrade for eligible Windows 10 PCs. Computers preloaded with Windows 11 will also be available starting on the same day.

Windows 11, much like Windows 10, will roll out in phases over the coming weeks and months. At first, Microsoft will seed the upgrade to eligible devices. If you want to know if your device is eligible, check this document on Microsoft's support site. Following that, Windows 11 "will then roll out over time to in-market devices based on intelligence models that consider hardware eligibility, reliability metrics, age of device and other factors that impact the upgrade experience."

Aaron Woodman, General Manager of Windows Marketing, says that Microsoft expects every eligible device to be offered the free upgrade by mid-2022. Once your Windows 10 device is eligible, Windows Update will let you know when you can upgrade. If you're getting antsy, you can also manually check by going to Settings > Windows Update and clicking "Check for updates."

Microsoft also took the opportunity to highlight some of the most notable features of Windows 11. As you've seen in screenshots and videos, Microsoft has totally refreshed the user interface. Everything from the Start menu to the toolbar to the menus look and sound different on Windows 11. Microsoft is also introducing Snap Layouts, Snap Groups, and Desktops to improve multitasking. Microsoft has also integrated Teams directly into the toolbar. There are also new Widgets, an overhauled Microsoft Store, accessibility improvements, and more.

Finally, it's worth noting that some Windows 11 features will not be available at launch. For example, support for Android apps won't be ready on day one, but a preview for Windows Insiders is coming.

Windows 10 will be supported into 2025

If you want to make sure that your device is eligible for Windows 11, Microsoft will soon relaunch the PC

Health Check app. If you are not able to upgrade your device, there's good news. Microsoft plans to continue supporting Windows 10 through October 14th, 2025. Beyond supporting the aging OS, Microsoft also recently announced a feature update for Windows 10 coming in 2021.

Notably, even if your computer does fail the health check, you can still apply the upgrade. It's a slightly more complicated process, and there are still minimum specifications to be wary of, but at least it's possible.
