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at Home - Use the time, productively

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Now that you have the time, it may be time to catch up on all those computer projects that you have been meaning to do. Some of those projects may be more like maintenance such as backing up your data or system. And some may be more fun like organizing your picture, video, or music collections. Don't have those collections, well then now may be the time to start creating them. Anyone who has a smartphone, probably has a picture collection, though they may not be able to decide where all the pictures are located. Are the pictures on the device or in the cloud or both? Google Photos provides cloud storage for as many photos as you want to store in the cloud. (But Google Drive is limited to 15 GB.) One way to get your arms around the picture collection is to get them all on one device, your computer, and then organize and maintain them on that device. All you need to use to connect the smartphone to the computer is a USB cable that supports data. (Remember that some USB cables are only for charging a device and cannot transfer data.) File explorer is the tool to use on a PC and the Finder is the tool on the Mac. Oh, and make sure you change the name of any picture that is put into your collection from something like "IMG 20082100034" to something that makes some sense. If you have a collection of pictures that you want to show people on your phone, you can create a folder for them on the pc and then copy them to your phone. (Copy them to the DCIM or DCIM-camera folder on the phone.) Once they are on the phone you can use any picture viewer like "gallery" on an android device or "pictures" on an iOS device.





So what about music and videos? Well, Microsoft gives music and videos their own top-level folders (Under "This PC" in File Explorer) indicating they think many people will save and maybe even organize these two types of media files. Music is pretty easy to think about organizing because music distributors have been doing this for the past almost 100 years, probably since Edison began selling recordings. We

can organize our music easily by artist and possibly by Genre. Music organization by Genre has been around a very long time. In fact, as part of the meta-data that is part of every music file (.mp3 being the most popular file type), there is a parameter included for Genre in addition to those you might expect such as title, artist, album, composer, year, contributing artist, album, and track number. Music players like Windows Media Player and iTunes use this metadata to organize, present, and play your music collection. Our job is mostly to collect the music, which in most cases boils down to "ripping" our CD music collection. Ripping music from a CD is the process of moving (and possibly converting) the music file from a CD to a computer; a perfectly legal process, even if it sounds nefarious. Once this is done, the file can be played on any device with an appropriate music player. Once you have a collection of music files, the music player uses those files with the included metadata to organize the collection. And then you can create playlists within the music player to play the music selections in a sequence of your choice. So, maybe it's time to get on with ripping your CD collection, now that you have the time. Note that if you don't want to go the Rip-CDs route, you can always purchase music from one of the many online music stores such as iTunes or Amazon.



When it comes to organizing music, the task is pretty clear, but what about videos? Video file organization can be a big project. Videos can range from those short (10 to 15 second) videos that you've taken with your smartphone, to professional feature-length movies. For the feature-length movies it might be best to just let Amazon, Netflix, or YouTube keep track of them, and then you can use (and pay for) the service whenever you want to see the movie. If you have a DVD movie collection, you might try to treat them like CDs and convert the DVD files to computer files and store them in a movie database, but it may be easier to just find some shelf space and organize them alphabetically. The smartphone videos, and that could include all of those cute animal videos that get sent around attached to emails, could be collected and organized into a video database. I will not even attempt to describe a database for these because it is probably very different for each of us, due to our own special interests. The only thing to do is to start with a basic hierarchical organization and modify it as needed. Start with a folder for Videos and then create subfolders for any area of interest. I have created folders for "humor", "vacations", "friends", family", "politics", "magic tricks", "technology"... you get the idea. Create a new sub-folder whenever a folder gets too full for convenient searching. Make sure you give the videos a representative file name before you put the video into the database or you may never be able to find it again.



And there is one last task for those of us who have thought about taking advantage of the electronic books at the library, but never have gotten around to it. The county library system has electronic books (eBooks) and magazines you can read on your electronic device. With a library card and the right Apps on your device, you can borrow the books, read them and return them to the library without ever leaving the comfort, and more importantly in these times, the safety of your home. (Overdrive and Libby are apps that help you borrow eBooks from the library, and Kindle and Libby are eBook readers.) I'm sure you can find a few other tasks that you've been thinking of doing, but right now it might be more fun to just find some entertaining videos on YouTube and leave those projects for another time.



KEEP UP WITH YOUR IPHONE / IPAD APPS

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Technology "apps" (short for "applications" or "software") are doing so much to help us in many ways. You probably have noticed that your apps need updating and if you do not have "auto-update" turned on in your settings, then you should be updating your apps whenever there is an update available. Updates improve the app, hopefully, resolve problems, and add new features too. You may have no-

ticed that your favorite apps DO change – different colors, menu choices, options, and images. Are you aware of the latest changes to the apps you love and use most?

It's hardly any trouble to update an app but rarely

do people take the time to find out what is actually in the update. There could be some hidden treasures there waiting for you! The iPhone, for example, has some big updates (almost annually) which can make the "look and feel" of your iPhone (or iPad) quite a bit different. But many updates to most apps do not make big changes to what you see on your screen, but change some things "behind the curtain".


Are the apps on your iPhone or iPad being updated automatically? To find out, touch "Settings" on your iPhone (the logo looks like a gear wheel), and then scroll down a bit to touch "iTunes and App Store". Here you will see a list of several options – look under "Automatic Downloads" for "App Updates" – the sliding button to the right will be GREEN if it is ON and gray if it is not. I would recommend that you turn this ON. Note that even if this is turned "on", the lat-

est updates may not be installed immediately, it may take some days.

Why not make a shortlist of those apps you use most often? On my list, for example, would be my weather (WeatherBug), calendar, photos, messages, and Google maps to name a few. To find out the updates that have been "released" or made available for any app -- on your device start by touching the "App Store" icon and then, in the search bar, enter the name of your app (such as "WeatherBug"). You will see an oval box that will say "open" or "update" if that app needs updating. Now touch that app and it will open the App Store description about that app. Touch on the text "Version History" to see a list of the latest updates AND what each update did.

Many updates just fix internal bugs or problems and

do not change anything you see on your screen. But is it always wise to take a few minutes and ask Google "What new features are on the "WeatherBug" app?" and you will be given a list of articles that describe the new or latest included features. Scan over this



list to see which of these changes affect you and how you use that app. (I am just using "WeatherBug" as an example). Some of the things I learned was that I could customize my starting screen that appears when I open this app, I can put what most interests me first on the screen. I also learned how to add and delete any city's weather on my list so I can easily see the weather in other places on earth. Then I noticed many options I had no idea were included in that app! To be honest, most of them did not interest me, but several did. This is true of ANY app. Many of us (myself included) go along and keep using our favorite apps and never become aware of the new options included in recent updates. So why not "take an app a day" and ask Google about it? – You are certain to learn some new things that will make you even better at using and enjoying the apps you love.



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

Searching for Solutions to Computer Problems



A while back, I was diligently working on the weekly meal plan and shopping list for our happy household. I do this by copying the previous week's plan and editing it while reviewing the online versions of the local supermarket weekly ads. My meal plan Word document has two columns: one for the menus and one for the shopping list. Here's a screenshot ...



The exact details don't matter. I use Word tables for the two columns. This document has worked fine for several years.

I was working on it last week and, suddenly, when I tried to place the Word cursor at a location within the table so that I could type in some changes, the cursor simply could not be placed anywhere inside either table. All the tools in the ribbon were clickable. I saved and closed the document and Word. When I reopened the document, the cursor worked properly for a bit until I clicked something outside the table; then once again I couldn't place it anywhere inside the table. By repeatedly closing the document and reopening it, I was able to finish the meal plan, print it, and hand it off to Mrs. Burt, so she could plan out her weekly shopping expedition. However, this was not going to be viable long term.

Later that day, I decided to search the web to see if others had experienced this problem. I used Google and entered **word 365 won't accept cursor in table** as my search word set. The search produced 600,000 hits! I browsed through the first page of search results and the 5th item down from the top was the following:



This article included a suggestion that if I had set **explicit row heights** in the table (I had), that I remove those row height settings. I tried that and "voila!", the problem with placing the cursor went away. I then reset the row heights in the tables to their former values and saved the document. After this, I had no trouble placing the cursor anywhere on either table.

So, it appears that my Meal Plan spreadsheet in some subtle way had become corrupt or triggered some latent bug in MS Word. The "fix" (really a hack) worked, so I'm happy. However, I would never have thought to try that fix because that document had worked fine for years.

The moral of this story is that, when you encounter bizarre behavior in Windows, Office, or other applications, don't beat yourself up. Once you've tried the simple, obvious things without success, it's time to fire up your favorite search engine (Google, Bing, DuckDuckGo, ...) and see what suggestions others might have to offer.

The key to success is in the phrasing of your search terms. If an error message is popping up, use that error code as one of your search terms. Be as specific as you can to narrow your search results to ones likely to be related to your problem. Include the name and possibly the version of the program as a search term. If you don't get an answer with one set of search terms, try varying the terms with synonyms. Try being a bit more (or less) specific. And don't give up after reviewing the first page of results; sometimes the real gems are further down in the result list.



Some Useful Windows 10 Features

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While many users consider Windows 10 the most complicated operating system Microsoft has come up with yet, it does contain a lot of handy new features. Some of these have been present in some form since the beginnings of Windows, and others have been introduced by Microsoft's newer versions of Windows 10. I personally think Windows 10 is by far the best version of Windows ever, for the built-in security if nothing else. I have never had to remove a virus from an operating system running Windows 10 with Windows Security activated and current, which are the defaults.

Notifications

Windows provides users with popups notifying users of a system or news event. These and pretty much all popups provide a minimum of useful information and are more annoying and distracting than anything else.

Many Sites visited while surfing the Internet will display a popup offering to send you notifications of certain events. I recommend you "Just say no" to this offer, unless the notifications are for something you deem important. Notifications can also come from your system, i.e. you might get a notification that Windows security has completed a scan finding nothing. Most users would be best served by turning off notifications completely, and the newer versions of Windows 10 make this easier than ev-

er. Click (clicks are always left-clicks unless otherwise indicated) on the Notifications icon at the far right of your Taskbar, then click on Manage notifications at the top right side of the window that appears. You are in the Notifications and actions section of Settings. The top slider switch provides an opportunity to turn off all notifications. Or if you like you can leave notifications on and in the area below the on/off slider, elect to receive or not receive notification from specific sources.

Dictation



If you haven't used voice-to-text software in recent years, you will be amazed at how far this technology has come. Windows 10 has been no slouch in applying artificial Intelligence (AI) to this task. You can now dictate into any application. To turn on dictation in Windows 10, hold down the Windows logo key near the lower left-hand corner of your keyboard and press the letter H on your keyboard. A microphone indicator rectangle will appear at the top-center of your screen. Just place your cursor in any field ready to receive text (like a Word document you are creating) and start talking. Now with a little practice you don't have to deal with keyboarding; you can dictate your content, just like I did for this sentence. Period.

Snip & Sketch Tool



The snipping tool has been in Windows 10 for a

number of years, but until recently it couldn't compete with third party screen capture software.

Snip & Sketch is Windows' newest, best approach yet to capturing all or part of an image on your screen.

Start by holding down the Windows logo key on your keyboard and pressing Shift and the letter S. This creates a small dialogue bar at the top of your screen where you can choose from rectangular, free form, square, or full screen capture. Choose the shape of you clip, hold down the left mouse button and drag it over the area you want to capture. Let go of the mouse button and the clip will be saved to your clipboard. If you go directly to your destination, right-click and select paste.

That Snipping Tool example is the perfect segue into another valuable feature of Windows 10, the clipboard. Many of us might have forgotten that all items copied into the clipboard stay there until we reboot our system. Hold down the Windows logo key and the letter V to see a listing of all items, text and graphics, that has been copied into the clipboard. Just click on any item listed (even if you copied 10 subsequent items, and that becomes the current item to be pasted.
